After moving to Oregon, I volunteered at Meridian Park Hospital as an escort, Medical Teams International as an equipment repair person and at Summerfield on various Committees and Clubs and now as the Civic Association Board President. The City will provide affected property owners with 3 week advance notice and areas will be closed for no more than 4 hours at a time. Alderbrook Drive to be re-paved in 2012. Regarding Durham Road maintenance, motion made, seconded and approved to submit letter from SCA Board to Mayor regarding concerns and request area be addressed immediately.

Architectural Committee



The building code requires a six inch concrete barrier between the ground and the wood structure of a house. Over the years that barrier can narrow or widen due to erosion and settling. Survey your foundation and if the concrete gap is over six inches you are safe. However, if the gap is less than six inches then you need to shovel or rake some of the dirt away.

Landscaping that is allowed uncontrolled growth can also become a bridge for termites to invade your house. Ground cover can send out tendrils that climb the termite gap and actually continue to grow under the protective cover of your house. Cut back or remove all such growth.

To you, your house may be your home that is warm and dry and protects you from the heat, cold, wet and wind. But to a termite, your house can be nothing more than breakfast, lunch and dinner.

Question: Are your smoke alarms working? The truth about fire—it's the smoke that kills!

There is an on going discussion regarding organizing a workshop this fall or winter, concerning the fire safety of our homes here in Summerfield. The main focus of the workshop will be about SMOKE ALARMS, making sure that they are in working order, the placement, testing, and maintenance and developing a fire escape plan. We are working with the Tualatin Valley Fire & Rescue and will be brainstorming with them on how best to present this information. Below is an article that TVF&R provided.

Working Smoke Alarms Save Lives

On February 20th 2011, Tualatin Valley Fire & Rescue crews responded to a residential fire on SW 94th Avenue in Summerfield. Firefighters from King City and Tigard arrived within minutes of the first 9-1-1 call and quickly waged an aggressive search and firefighting effort, but sadly, the smoke generated by the fire overwhelmed the 69-year-old female homeowner. It is believed that she was disoriented and confused by the toxic smoke that filled her home and while she was attempting to escape, she collapsed where she was found later by firefighters. Despite efforts to administer lifesaving care, she lost her life due to smoke inhalation. At the time of the fire, it was unknown whether or not there were working smoke alarms in the home.

In the days following the fire, TVF&R firefighters and Deputy Fire Marshals canvassed homes in the immediate area answering neighbor's questions and testing smoke alarms. In testing smoke alarms, it was discovered that approximately 25% of the alarms were inoperable and needed replacement. This high number of inoperable smoke alarms should be a concern for every homeowner in Summerfield. Due to the age of Summerfield structures, smoke alarms may not have been replaced in the last 10 years which means: a) they do not comply with current home smoke alarms standards*, and b) yours may not be working!

A real fire is nothing like what is portrayed on television or in the movies. Fire doubles in size every 30 seconds and generates toxic smoke so thick you can't see your hand in front of your face. The majority of fire deaths occur at night and are due to smoke inhalation. To protect yourself and allow enough time to safely escape a fire, you must have working smoke alarms. For maximum protection, smoke alarms should be placed on every level of your home between the living and the sleeping areas, and in every bedroom. In addition to working smoke alarms, you need a well thought out escape plan taking into consideration your living style, any physical limitations you or your loved ones may have, and whether you live in a single or two-story home.

In closing, if your smoke alarms are not working, or they are more than ten years old, they need to be replaced. Your life and the lives of your loved ones depend on it! Grandparent Reminders—Swimming Pool Safety

The Summerfield Swimming Pool rules were designed to keep everybody safe while enjoying our beautiful pool. Here are a few of the key reminders. The full rules are posted at the pool, on our website and copies are available in the Clubhouse.

Please remember ***you are responsible*** for your guests at the swimming pool. You ***must*** accompany your guests if they are at the pool. PLEASE REMEMBER, ***YOU ARE THEIR LIFEGUARD!***

Running, jumping, diving, "cannon-balling" and ***ANY*** roughhousing is strictly forbidden to prevent injuries and for the safety of everyone. Imagine how you would feel if your grandchild was hurt because you didn't make him or her follow this rule....or equally bad, if his or her roughhousing injured another child or resident.

Diapers of any kind and children of diaper age are ***absolutely not allowed*** in the pool or in the fenced pool area. In addition to fecal borne disease concerns for everyone, older people frequently have immune deficiencies making us highly susceptible to these diseases.

Always sign in when you arrive in case we should ever need to notify you of a pool problem.

No more than four guests per household are permitted in the fenced area at any one time.

NATURAL-BORN KILLERS

Nature regulates itself. A garden dependent upon artificial fertilizers and pesticides is flawed in design. Fertilizers, synthesized from fossil fuels or dug up from phosphate-rich Pacific islands, can harm native wildlife by promoting the growth of weeds that compete for resources. When washed into lakes, rivers, and streams, they encourage algae growth, killing fish. Pesticides, meanwhile, kill beneficial insects along with pests, can directly harm other species, and pose a threat to humans when they accumulate in the food chain. Fertilizers, when applied improperly, can contaminate ground and surface water. Choose eco-efficient gardening solutions. Native plants will thrive without fertilizer. Insect-eating animals and complementary planting of natural herbicides will reduce the need for pesticides. Use an organic pesticide made out of hot pepper, garlic, chili to control aphids and caterpillars.
