The second topic is caring for your second home, the Clubhouse. In the past nine months since the Clubhouse was renovated, there have been many spills and dribbles in the Ballroom, Lakeside Room and the hall between the kitchen and those two rooms, yet minimal problems in most of the other rooms and lobby. We all recognize that these spills and dribbles are a common problem when food is served anywhere but we ask that you treat these areas as you would your home and take the time

Please report any liquid spills (except water) to your group's coordinator to allow the spilled areas to be cleaned up with the recommended carpet cleaning solutions (available in the kitchen). We have budgeted three annual professional cleanings of these areas but ongoing care will keep the carpet looking great between these scheduled cleanings. In the past we have found chocolate cake ground into the carpet with no attempt to clean it up and wine and coffee spills with no notification to anyone who could address them in a timely fashion. The sooner you can clean them, the easier it is to make the area look like new. Thanks for your help and support in maintaining our splendid Clubhouse. We hear many positive comments from our potential new residents who take the opportunity to tour the Clubhouse while home shopping. ## December 12, 2011

Present: Pfeifer, Kerns, Nottingham, Thiemann, Sacconaghi, Vogel, Wilcox, Froeber, DeWild, Parkinson. Absent: None. Minutes approved from the November 14, 2011 meeting. President Pfeifer asked for a moment of silence to honor Cecil Sims, Past SCA Board President.

**Visitors:** Diane Rhodes presented two neighborhood concerns, one related to a non-resident motorhome parked on City street and the other related to occupancy clarification and safety.

**Golf Pro Shop Report - Lindsey:** Play statistics reviewed for November and year-to-date. Junior tournament date to be determined for 2012, anticipate 60 – 120 golfers, ages 8 to 14. Involved with First Tee program of Portland. Oregonian ads for Public Annual Golf Tag have generated 6 pre-reserved tags. Discussed SMGC guest policy.

## Treasurer's Report – Nottingham:

Operating Account: November Total Income of \$16,462.59; November Total Expenditures of \$61,070.16; Cash on hand as of 11/30/11 of \$96,218.43. Reserve Account: General Reserve Balance as of 11/30/11: \$162,346.46; New Buyers Fee income for November: \$4,000; New Buyers Fee account balance as of 11/30/11: \$88,124.63; Total General Reserves plus New Buyers Fee account: \$250,471.09. Check registers reviewed for November. Motion made, seconded and approved to accept the entire Treasurer's report.

## Correspondence – Administrator:

Correspondence with lawyer related to one 2011 past due account and carpet. Additional correspondence related to excessive cats and two occupancy clarifications.

**A. Final 2012 Operating Budget Approval:** Motion made, seconded and approved (one denial) to accept final 2012 operating budget which includes the 2012 annual assessments and fees.

## Report from Darlene Young – City Liaison:

Darlene absent, so report from Hal Thiemann regarding meeting with City of Tigard representatives about Durham Road right-of-way landscape maintenance. Representatives explained history and plan. Confirmed that Durham Road was first on list; funding is in place; bids to landscaping companies go out in January and work should start by February or March. Also confirmed that certain Summerfield streets will receive slurry seal or re-paving next summer (correspondence sent directly to affected property addresses).

## New Business:

**A. Clubhouse Committee Deck Railing Proposal:** Motion made, seconded and approved to accept proposed bid from Black Diamond Homes, Inc. to upgrade Clubhouse deck railing to current code, not to exceed \$12,550.

**B. Copy Machine Proposal:** Motion made, seconded and approved to proceed with purchase of new Clubhouse copy machine per proposal of \$4,684.

**C. Treasurer's Advisory Committee Recommendations:** Motion made, seconded and approved (one denial) to accept Treasurer's Advisory Committee's recommendation to perform annual review in 2012, rather than annual audit.

**D. Final 2012 Reserve Study Approval:** Motion made, seconded and approved to

approve final 2012 Reserve Study.

**Sacsonaghi –** Motion made, seconded and approved to add Jim Mathiesen and Bob Meek as members of Clubhouse Committee. Dick Van Dyke is Vice President. Member Sharon Strain is exploring new chair / table options for Clubhouse. Reminder about sub-associations meeting on 12/15.

**Vogel –** Golf Pro Shop outstanding; pleased with tournament planning and merchandise. Marketing Committee continuing work on prioritizing signage and new website review. Dezendorf provided report from 1<sup>st</sup> Sunday.

**Parkinson –** Occupancy running at 98.3%. Apartments participating in Toys for Tots drive. Working on finding Neighborhood Watch reps from Apartments. Finalizing 2012 budget and created Facebook page.

**Thiemann –** Architectural and Landscape Manual and Change Request Form printed and published on website. New golf course shoe cleaning area bids to be obtained. Clubhouse and golf maintenance shop security and access bids to be obtained.

**Nottingham –** Reviewing SCA insurance package with broker.

**DeWild –** Occupancy growing but it is a tough time of year.

The Summerfield Book Club will meet on Tuesday, January 10<sup>th</sup> at 2:00 PM in the Clubhouse Conference Room to review Major Pettigrew's Last Stand by Helen Simonson.

The setting is Edgcombe St. Mary, a small village in the English countryside filled with rolling hills and thatched cottages. The book has a cast of characters both hilariously original and as familiar as the members of your own family. Among them is Major Ernest Pettigrew (retired), the unlikely hero of Helen Simonson's wondrous debut. Wry, courtly, opinionated, and completely endearing, Major Pettigrew is one of the most indelible characters in contemporary fiction, and from the very first page of this remarkable novel he will steal your heart. The Major leads a quiet life valuing the proper things that Englishmen have lived by for generations: honor, duty, decorum, and a properly brewed cup of tea. Then to his door comes the dignified, elegant,

foreign-looking woman 10 years his junior, Mrs. Ali, a shopkeeper the townspeople deem to be either Pakistani or Indian. Though Major Pettigrew and Mrs. Ali find themselves drawn together by their shared love of literature and the loss of their respective spouses, village society insists on embracing him as the quintessential local and her as the permanent foreigner. Can their relationship survive the risks one takes when pursuing happiness in the face of culture and tradition?

Author Helen Simonson says, "I should add that I hope you'll find the book funny and that you'll enjoy the Major's values and character. I believe he might remind us all that the world is what we make of it." I invite you to immerse yourself in this best seller to help the gloomy winter days pass more quickly, and then join us for what is sure to be an interesting discussion at the book club in January! If you want to get an early start on February's book, it is In the Garden of Beasts by Erik Larson.

## People in Profile: OIE LOOD



One of our Summerfield neighbors came to us from quite a distance and by a circuitous route. Oie Lood was born in Estonia but was forced to leave there with her family in September, 1944, just 48 hours before the Russian army arrived to take over the country from the

Germans. The Germans had occupied the country since 1942 but it was the threat of Russian domination that caused the Lood family to flee to Germany, via a German ship carrying wounded soldiers. After a stay in a refugee camp, Oie was given the opportunity to go to England to work in a TB sanitarium, along with several other Estonian young women, leaving her parents behind in Germany.

Working in the kitchen there was a shock to Oie, as she had never worked and the family had employed servants in Estonia. Shortly, however, Oie was chosen to take nurses' training. She had been well educated in Estonia, with an academic high school curriculum that included lots of math, science, history as well as German, English and Estonian.

Oie had met a young man in the refugee camp who shortly followed her to England. She and Henry were married by a Lutheran pastor in 1948. They were two young people with no money, no country, no home, but had their youth, education, ambition, and lots of ideas!

In 1949, their son, Peter was born. When he was just two years old, they were contacted by a family friend in Alberta, Canada, about a job there, so away they went to Canada and found themselves on an isolated ranch in the country. Henry became a "cowboy" and Oie worked in the kitchen. When they read in a newspaper that an Estonian pastor was conducting Lutheran services in Estonian in Vancouver, B.C., they packed their few belongings and headed west.

In Vancouver both got jobs and both attended the University of British Columbia. Oie's parents followed and cared for Peter while both parents worked and studied. Oie took courses in medical records and became director of the medical records department at Vancouver General

Hospital. They owned their own home and had settled in when they heard of an opening for a medical records position at Providence Hospital in Portland, Oregon. Oie applied, got the job and retired from there some twenty years later! In the meantime, Henry, although he studied Pharmacology, built three houses in Coronado Shores on the Oregon coast and adopted construction as his life's work, hiring Estonian refugees as often as possible.

Son Peter graduated from Grant High School, then PSU, but not before Oie herself graduated, also from PSU, with a BA in Psychology. Peter then went to OSHU received his DMD degree and became a dentist, practicing in Woodburn for 35 years. Oie became a US citizen in 1994.

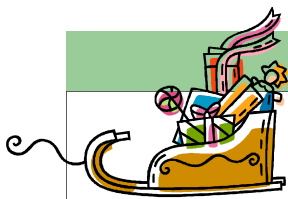
After living in Coronado Shores for a few years after retirement, Oie and Henry moved to Summerfield in 1997 to live in the Fountains in a lovely spacious condo in which many, many pieces of Estonian art, photos and other mementos keep the homeland close to Oie's heart.

Henry passed away one year ago and Oie carried his ashes to be buried in her family's cemetery in Estonia. Henry's family plots had been destroyed by the Russians. The burial was attended by many members of Henry and Oie's Estonian families. Oie is very proud of the fact that Estonia became free again in 1991 and is now the Democratic Republic of Estonia.

Oie keeps very busy these days with volunteer work such as being a certified Ombudsman for the State of Oregon, visiting assisted living and foster homes to assure that her clients needs are met. She is the Neighborhood Watch chairperson for the Fountains, plays bridge avidly, was an AAUW member for many years and keeps in shape for all of this by swimming regularly when the weather permits.

Oie serves as an example to all of us of how hard work and determination (plus a lot of courage and daring) lead to such productive and successful lives as those lived by the Loods.

## Washington County Foster Children Giving Tree

Summerfield residents turned out in full support of Washington County's annual Foster Children gift drive. Last year we received 55 tags and Summerfield provided 42 gifts, as many as 3 requests on each tag. This year there were 75 tags and Summerfield was able to provide **63 gifts!** There have been several questions about how tags work. The Scotty Foundation collects names of the foster children through Washington County in September. Many children come into foster care after tags are made. Tags are represented on two different trees. When gifts are collected, they are taken to a warehouse in Beaverton where each child/tag is given a large bag. Gifts are placed on top of the bag until all gifts are distributed. If a child's name has been chosen twice, the extra gift is given to a child who did not come into foster care in sufficient time to receive a tag.

Summerfield residents donated an array of gifts including two bicycles, computer games, clothing, toys, and gift cards. A Nike employee, whose parents reside in Summerfield, donated two pairs of adult men's tennis shoes (teen boys' tags are often not chosen). Donna Allen, a Summerfield resident who headed a toys for tots drive for the Oregon PERS, provided 200 toys which were donated by PERS employees. Also, Donna's agency arranged for Willamette Writers, a publishing company, to donate 500 books to foster children. For a second year, the Morning Tigard Rotary Club has donated gift cards. **It is with deep appreciation that we thank all who have so generously contributed to this very worthwhile event.**

### Ask the Administrator *By Cari Froeber*

**Q: I thought we were a 55+ community—how come I keep seeing young people around here?**

A: First of all, these are actual questions; I don't make these up! And yes, we are a designated age 55+ community. That means we are required to have 80% of our residents be over age 55 and the other 20% (and not more!) must follow OUR CC&Rs for age restrictions. That means that a spouse can be under age 55 or an adult child (age 18+) can live with a resident. We have lots of adult children living with residents, both due to the economy and as a way to provide assistance to their parents. Based on our most recent age audit, we are nowhere near the 20% under age 55. Anybody under age 18 is most likely just

visiting (permissible of course)! If you question the occupancy status of a neighbor and are uncomfortable approaching them about it, feel free to inquire with the office. As always, the office needs to obtain paperwork for each qualified resident and collect the annual assessment (pro-rated if necessary).

**Q: Why are the office hours only 8 AM to 12 noon?**

A: It probably has to do with part-time versus full-time office employees. However, this is something that could certainly change in the future. For now though, most of our association information and forms are available in the Clubhouse hallway and on our website, but if need

something else (the exterior color paint book, for example) and you can't get in during office hours, just let me know and I'll make it work. I can leave it out somewhere in the Clubhouse with your name on it or even drop it by your house if you don't drive.

**Q: What is the policy on running obituaries in the Summary?**

A: We have lost some really fantastic residents lately and my condolences go out to the families. This *Summary* newsletter has policies about what can and can't be published and in the case of obituaries, the only permissible notice is for a past Board President still residing in Summerfield or a long-term SCA employee.
