## January 9, 2012

Present: Pfeifer, Nottingham, Thiemann, Sacconaghi, Vogel, Wilcox, Froeber, Parkinson. Absent: Kerns, DeWild. Minutes approved from the December 12, 2011 meeting. No visitors.

**Golf Pro Shop Report - Lindsey:** Play statistics reviewed for December and year-to-date. Alpha Golf Card has 632 sold so far, though no play yet on our course. Using new cart rental agreement and adding rules card to each cart. Still working on junior tournament dates. Hal Thiemann presented initial project idea for enhancing area near tee #1, including a paver area near tennis courts, a speaker with wireless system to use for starters and a covered bulletin board for SCA advertising, rules, etc.

**Treasurer's Report – Nottingham:** December Total Income of \$16,295.08; December Total Expenditures of \$62,830.12; Cash on hand as of 12/31/11 of \$49,849.39. General Reserve Balance as of 12/31/11: \$159,640.71; New Buyers Fee income for December: \$10,000; New Buyers Fee account balance as of 12/31/11: \$98,125.32; Total General Reserves plus New Buyers Fee account: \$257,766.03. Check registers reviewed for December. Motion made, seconded and approved to accept the entire Treasurer's report. Discussion regarding financial statements and excess operating net income transferred to Reserves after financial review.

## **Correspondence – Administrator:**

Verification of property 'renting while selling'; confirmation that excessive cats property found alternate arrangements for cats. Working with CMI on joint letter to resident that may be renting property illegitimately. All other correspondence related to assessment collections.

### **A. Clubhouse Committee Set-up/Take Down/Cleaning Recommendations:**

Motion made, seconded and approved to accept recommendation that Custodian/Maintenance provide set-up/take down privileges to all Clubs, provided that the request follows the 7-days in advance rule and other scheduling permits (back to back events still require responsibility of first event to take down / clean in preparation for next event). Clubs are also encouraged to use existing set-ups available (such as in Conference Room, Ballroom, etc.).

**Thiemann** – Thanks to Warren Grabinski on Architectural Committee for his excellent monthly Summary submissions. Working on access and security RFP; invited representation from Clubhouse Committee. New golf course shoe cleaning area out to bid.

**Vogel** – Marketing Committee continuing work on new website review, signage and 1<sup>st</sup> Sunday. Greens Committee met 1/4/12 and Rick Sullivan has ordered new mats for 2<sup>nd</sup> hole. Nothing to report for Marshals or Summary.

**Sacsonaghi** – Next Clubhouse Committee is in February. Thank you to the Summerfield Estates for their donation of 150 plates for our kitchen. Black Diamond is working on painting the railings for the deck.

**Parkinson** – Occupancy at 97% and projected to be strong for 2012. Slight rent increases to cover increased expenses. For new renters, they are being charged for utilities separately.

Hal Thiemann introduced concept of cogeneration, the simultaneous production of heat and power in a single thermodynamic process. Summerfield Civic Association could consider supplying our own energy using natural gas and selling it back to the utility. It is an early concept to be functional, but something to consider in the years to come.

Motion to adjourn, seconded and approved. Meeting adjourned at 11:03 AM. Next Board Meeting is February 13<sup>th</sup> at 9 AM in the Conference Room.

## Summerfield Book Club



**Please note: there has been a change of the book for the Book Club for February.** Instead of In the Garden of the Beasts, by Erik Larson, the book for February will be My Antonia by Willa Cather. The reason for the change is difficulty in reserving the book; also, the book will not be out in paperback until May for those who want to purchase it. In the Garden of the Beasts, will be discussed in August.

My Antonia tells the story of several immigrant families who move to rural Nebraska. Antonia is the eldest daughter of the Shimerdas and is a bold, free-hearted young woman who becomes the center of narrator Jim Burden's attention. The story has many elements but clearly documents the struggles of the hard-working immigrants that homesteaded the prairies, and does a particularly fine job covering the hardships that women faced in that difficult environment. My Antonia also provides Willa Cather with a platform to make some comments on women's rights while weaving a story where romantic interests are ultimately bandied about by the uncontrolled changes that occur in people's lives.

Author Willa Cather moved to the Nebraska prairie at the age of nine. When she first saw the wide Nebraska prairie, Cather hated it. She felt as if there was no end to the land, and that there was no sign of human activity anywhere. However, Cather enjoyed listening to stories told by her immigrant neighbors, many of whom were Swedish, Bohemian, German, and Danish, and the stories provided Cather with material for her best novels. My Antonia, first published in 1918, is the final book of her prairie trilogy and is considered her greatest accomplishment. Cather's novels left a legacy of the unbreakable and irrepressible spirit of the American pioneers.

The book for March will not change. It is Death in Holy Orders by P.D.James.

Other Book Club news: at the January meeting members voted for dues of \$1.00 a year to defray the costs incurred of copies, etc. It is requested that you bring your dues to the February meeting. Also a correction: the title of the book for April is Going to Bend, not Going to Oregon as listed on the book list.

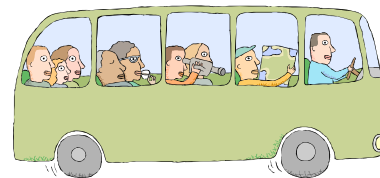

## Summerfield Rose Garden Volunteers Needed

Summerfield has a Rose Garden at the east end of Highland Drive. It was planted many years ago by the neighbors who lived near it. These neighbors maintained it until they moved away or no longer could do the work. At that time, the Garden Club was asked to take over the maintenance of the garden and they have been taking care of it for more than five years. Now there are not enough members of the Garden Club who can volunteer to do the maintenance a garden of rose bushes requires. If the Rose Garden is to continue, at least six volunteers are needed to take on the responsibility.

What would be required of the volunteers? Each person would need to commit three to four hours a week during the growing season to weed, deadhead, prune, and apply chemicals as needed. During the dormant season, just a little time would be needed each week to make sure there are no weeds and do any necessary clean-up of the area.

In November and February, the customary rose pruning would be required. Volunteers can work as a team, in groups or individually. One of these people will also need to volunteer to oversee the maintenance and coordinate the work of the other volunteers. Necessary fertilizers and chemicals will be provided.

You can also contact the SCA Administrator, Cari Froeber, in the Summerfield Office. Because essential rose pruning is needed in mid-February, it is important to set up a team of volunteers immediately. If enough people have not volunteered by February 17<sup>th</sup>, the roses will be removed and low-maintenance shrubs will be planted in the spring.
