# **Annual Meeting 2022**

This report is a <u>recap</u> of the meeting. For details, see the minutes on the Clubhouse bulletin board.

#### July 11, 2022

President Sharon Strain called the meeting to order at 7:00 PM. No visitors signed in to speak. Minutes accepted from the July 12, 2021 Annual Board Meeting.

**Board Member Nomination Recap -**

**Madden:** The members of the Nominating Committee were chosen according to Section 3.2 of the SCA By-Laws. The goal of the 15-member Committee was to nominate three candidates to fill the three vacancies on the Board. There were 6 qualified candidates. After consideration and ranking, the members selected were II Gattuccio, Steve Blake and Dianne Phelps. All residents had the opportunity to meet the selected candidates at the annual Meet the Candidates Night. A brief introduction of each candidate was provided. Thank you to the Nominating Committee for their work.

#### **Financial Report—Knutson:**

For 2021, Civic Assessments & Miscellaneous was \$1,008,286, New Buyer Income was \$162,000 and the Golf Income was \$561,818 for a total income of \$1,732,104. The expenses included Administration and Golf came to \$1,205,450 and \$118,316 for a Transfer to Reserves, for total expenses of \$1,323,766, under budget \$72,698.

For 2022, the Income through 6/30/22 includes Administrative & Miscellaneous Income of \$903,055 and Golf Income of \$299,786 for a total income of \$1,202,841. The Administrative Expenses are \$478,954; Golf Expenses are \$30,413 and Transfer to Reserves of \$123,546 for a total of \$632,913, under budget \$94,101.

For the 2021 Reserves, the beginning balance was \$1,233,956 and the ending

Major Reserves expenditures in 2021 included a new greens mower and Toro truck for ground keeping, Pool

update, Clubhouse renovations, bunkers on the golf course and maintenance shop roof and paint.

#### **Director's Reports:**

balance was \$1,528,243.

Madden - Liaison to Greens, Pro Shop, Marketing: From the Pro Shop Golf Rounds in 2021 were 41,991 and golf revenue in 2021 was \$473,483. Golf Rounds in 2020 were 45,666 and 2020 revenue was \$467,293. Golf Rounds in 2019 was 34,390 and revenue was \$346,499.

Golf Pro Shop Report - R. Lindsey: Beat the budget by \$6,000, YTD \$2700. July is off to a great start considering 34 of the budget has been recovered. A tournament was played over the weekend, hosted by an outside company and it went really well bringing in many new players and a \$10,000 prize was awarded for a hole-in-one. The Pro Shop is busy preparing for the championships for Men's and Women's Golf

Golf Course - Palmer: Weather has dried up the greens a little more than desired. Preparing for Lift Construction and Chemical Shed with work to begin on both in August.

**Treasurer's Report**: Operating account: June 2022 total income of \$52,865.58; June 2022 total expenditures of \$90,361.48; Cash on hand as of 6/30/2022 \$852,526.79. Reserve account: June 2022 total income of \$172.27; June 2022 total expenditures of \$-24,428.65; General reserve balance as of 6/30/22 \$1,388,594.49. New Buyer Fee income for June \$12,000; New Buyer Fee interest \$8.91; New Buyer Fee account balance as of 6/30/22 \$228,422.78. Total General Reserves plus New Buyers Fee Account as of 6/30/22 \$1,617,017.27. Checks written in June: From Key Bank Operating checking account regular checks: #19200-19265, paychecks: #50355-50360; From US Bank Reserves checking account checks: 1116-1118; From Washington Federal Reserves Checking Account checks: none. Motion was made (Phelps), seconded (Blake) and approved to accept the entire Treasurer's report.

#### D. Summerfield Music Event

Motion made (Phelps), seconded (Blake) to accept Summerfield Music Event. Motion passed (5-2).

### E. CALC Bark Dust Proposal

Motion made (Blake), seconded (Gattuccio) for CALC to add and renew bark dust at several listed smaller points of CALC area at the cost of \$3200. Motion passed.

#### F. SCA Website Member Directory **Proposal**

Motion made (Knutson), seconded (Hughes) to allow Website Committee additional \$1000 to complete the reconstruction and addition of a member directory on the new SCA Website. Motion passed.

Meeting Adjourned for a break at 10:35 AM and called back to order at 10:40 AM

**Administrator's Report:** Correspondence received from the City of Tigard regarding a warning that fines will be issued for any additional "false alarm" visits by the City of Tigard Police. The Clubhouse doors at times can catch not latching completely which can then trip the alarm after hours sending a signal to the Police. There were 6 residences sold in June bringing the total YTD to 31. The Washington County Health Department shut down the SCA pool on July 14, until a solution could be made to a chemical dispersing machine. Pool & Spa reacted very quickly and came out to solve the issue and get the pool opened back up.



## **Pool Talk**

Did you hear about the couple who wanted to get married in a bathtub? They wanted a double ring ceremony...


Actually, our swimming pool gets a 'bathtub ring' when swimmers fail to rinse off their sweat, skin oils, and dirt with an adequate "cleansing" shower. Admittedly we do not provide soap. However, rubbing your skin under our nice warm shower water will do the same thing that our nice warm pool water will do after you've been in for 5-10 minutes. Because body oils, including sun tan oils, float they can drift onto the pool walls or into the skimmers where the sand filters slowly get clogged. We backwash the sand filters and clean the pool walls with detergent or <u>Comet</u> cleanser, which by the way is the same chemical as our Smart Shock stabilized chlorine product, but with grit added.

Thanks to all who helped diagnose and eventually repair the failed main 3-phase 240volt electrical supply to the pump house. The 45-year-old buried metal conduit corroded allowing the old 8-gauge aluminum wiring to short out. Our new above-ground conduit is visible along the top of the north cement retaining wall. It is possible a lightning strike initiated the damage, which included a melted 24-volt transformer for the west FOB gate, the 2-bulb LED light, and the Chemtrol automatic chemical dosing unit. Our new

dosing unit, ordered in late February, to replace the aging but then still working Chemtrol, is back-ordered or stuck in shipping. In the meantime, we are dosing manually twice daily.

If you put an umbrella up please put it back down when you leave. Many times your Pool Committee has to put them down while taking an evening stroll. Although we don't mind doing this for safety against winds above 12mph which can tip one over even with its 200 lb base. Our four large sunshade Umbrellas operate as shown in the picture. Please try them out and use them for morning and afternoon shade. You may wish to save this page for future reference.

# **Disaster Preparedness**



In case of a disaster of some form, such as the recent storms on the East and Gulf Coasts, are you prepared with reserve water, some food, a way to cook and heat your home, backup sanitation supplies and ways to help the neighbors if necessary? Utilities are still out in parts of the Eastern U.S. from those two storms. History experts tell us that we are overdue for a large earthquake in the Pacific NW - something like Level 9.0, in which case the water supply will most likely be down for weeks or more, and power will be out for a long time, including natural gas supplies, and emergency services such as Police, Fire and Medical support may be lost for days or weeks. The worst-case scenario is a solid four minutes of shaking with extensive damage

to all utility systems and tidal waves at the coast with maximum damage to roads and bridges. The PDX fuel site along the Willamette in NW Portland is built on fill land, and tanks are likely to rupture and sink – there goes all the fuel for cars, etc.

To cope with all this, one should be prepared with the following:


- 1. Reserve water supplies of 1 to 5 gallons per day per person, in a secure storage area. (Remember you have 40-plus gallons in the water heater) And a means to purify available tainted water if necessary.
- 2. Reserve food/meals for at least 2 weeks maybe a month or more.
- 3. A means to cook and heat water for meals and washing, if desired: a Camp stove with Butane or gas, a small briquette roaster/barbeque, a fireplace and wood.
- 4. Back-up sanitation supplies such as a camp toilet and disposal bags and a means to bury the bags.
- 5. A "Go Bag" with important documents, medications, first-aid supplies, minimal change of clothes, cash and weather protection.
- 6. Knowledge/training on when and how to secure your water and natural gas utility systems.
- 7. Emergency power systems for medical or communication system needs.

There may be eventual emergency support from FEMA, but that could take days or weeks due to the limited road and rail access, so we will most likely be "on our own" for a spell. People must be prepared to survive on their own and help their neighbors if possible.

If you would like to learn more about preparedness and be part of the Preparedness Team, please join us and come to our monthly meeting at 3 PM in the Conference Room every third Tuesday of the month. We can use more members/helpers, and you can learn a world of information about survival and helping others.

A LITTLE GOLF BALL HISTORY: The legendary Scottish golfer Tom Morris, when he was 14, apprenticed at St. Andrews with the difficult task of making "Feathery" golf balls. Stuffing boiled chicken and goose feathers into a small leather cover took time. He was only able to make 4 or 5 a day. This ball in 1836 cost about 5 schillings, which was expensive for those days, and one of the reasons only the wealthy played golf. Converting 5 schillings into today's dollars makes the cost about \$36.50 each or about \$438.00 a dozen. Recently a Feathery ball made by Tom Morris was auctioned off for £8,000 or \$12,500. That would make a dozen of them, if available, \$150,000.00. Today, if you are interested in hot golf balls, try the Dixon Fire, at \$75.00 a dozen. It's kind of like the Tesla of golf balls, claiming to be eco-friendly. Who knew?
