# What's going on with the Pool??

The main power to the pool pump house failed on June 3. This 3-wire aluminum cable runs underground from the Clubhouse lower level to the pump house. We have traced the path passing through the shrubs the north side of the pool where we expected to unearth a probable junction box with a bad connection (based on the evidence from testing the connections).

As of this writing, June 20, the box had not been located. We have scheduled work to install new copper wires and new conduit as soon as the electrician's schedule can permit.



#### June 13, 2022

President Sharon Strain called the meeting to order at 9:00 AM. No visitors signed in to speak. Minutes accepted from the May 9, 2022, regular Board Meeting.

Golf Course Report – Palmer: Zach has a full crew. Zach approved placement of Japanese Beetle traps to be set on course by Department of Agriculture as they trace this invasive species spread. Residents encouraged to allow traps too if approached by Dept. of Ag.

Golf Pro Shop Report – R. Lindsey: Lots of flags on course to note wet spots. Two new employees in Pro Shop, Carrie Hankins and Brad Crane. Men's and Women's club events in full swing and well attended.

#### City of Tigard Liaison Report - Sherman:

Barbara Sherman shared the City of Tigard Report Card which included that the Tigard Library has a new coffee shop, the Opportunity Café. The City of Tigard is working with Advance Tigard — a career advancement scholarship for immigrant and refugee community members. Continued work with the Public Safety Advisory Board and Washington County Mental Health Response Team, Proud ground — an affordable housing program, and the next phase of the Universal Plaza in downtown Tigard.

Administrator's Report: Corrected that there is a total of three outstanding assessments within Summerfield which have been turned over to the attorneys. Meet with the Candidates night scheduled for June 23.

# Ask the Administrator: Why Can't Pedestrians Use the Cart Paths?

Summerfield boasts a beautiful 9-hole Golf Course that is open to the public, its grounds abut up against many back yards, it is maintained by its own turf attendees and maintenance crew, and it maintains a separate insurance policy.

The smooth cart paths of the Summerfield Golf Course may look like an enticing place to take a stroll but they are not. Golf Cart paths are part of the golf course and are considered in bounds for play. There are many signs around Summerfield noting the cart paths. It is reported that thousands of people nationwide are injured by errant golf balls every year - these injuries include concussions, loss of eyesight, and broken bones. Imagine a ball coming at you at 100 miles an hour. Golf players are not expecting people to be walking on paths that are off-limits to pedestrians, much like a hockey player is not watching for a random object on the ice. Golf cart drivers too may not see a pedestrian in time to come to a stop.

During the off hours of the golf course – these paths that are a part of the course are closed just like the greens of the course. A public golf course is a privately owned property, it means the public is invited to play, not just members only. This means, that being on the cart paths after hours is trespassing. This is written in the Summerfield Policies and Procedures Section F 6.21 "Golf Course Use: The golf course, including cart paths, is to be used only for playing golf. Any other use, day or night, as riding, either in golf carts or on

bicycles, jogging or walking, is prohibited." Simply put, it is not safe, it is disrespectful, it is an interruption to play and it is illegal.



### **Turf Tales**

In late May and early June, I received a couple of visits from a representative of The Oregon Department of Agriculture. He stopped by to ask if he could place a few Japanese beetle traps on the golf course. I had heard that Portland had been working to eradicate this invasive species, so I was quick to tell him that we would be happy to help. After he left, my curiosity had been piqued, however, so I went onto the Department of Agriculture's website to find out more about the fight against this beetle, and found some really interesting information.

The Japanese beetle is certainly no new foe of horticulturalists in America. It was first found in the U.S. in the early 1900s in New Jersey and has caused considerable damage in the eastern part of the country. It has been found in small numbers

in the Portland Metro area several times but has been quickly and successfully eradicated each time.

In 2016, however, it was discovered in the Cedar Mill area in worrisome numbers. The Department of Agriculture embarked on a program to attempt to detect and eradicate Japanese Beetles in Portland.

In 2017, the first year of the project, they trapped over 24,000 beetles. Through insecticide treatments near the areas where significant numbers were found the previous year, the number of trapped beetles has fallen to about 3,600 beetles last year. This is great news and shows that we are winning in this fight and that we have the opportunity to save our environment from this invasive species.

Japanese beetles have a metallic green head and upper torso, and metallic brown wings, and are about 3/8ths of an inch long. They are especially damaging because they not only feed on the roots of grass and plants while they are in the early stages of their life as larvae under the soil surface, but also they feed on the leaves of over 300 species of plants once they emerge as adults. Another reason the beetles are so damaging is when they feed on a plant they release chemicals attracting other beetles to that plant. This leads often to the plant becoming overwhelmed, and once left with little or no leaf tissue, the plant's necessary functions such as photosynthesis are brought to a halt and the plant is likely to die.

Although the overall numbers have significantly decreased in the Portland Metro Area, there is still much

work to be done to stop this invasion. Last year we were given a warning shot across our bow when a small number of Japanese beetles were trapped near Naeve Street and 109<sup>th</sup> Avenue. This is what prompted the Department of Agriculture to ask to put a few traps on the golf course. The traps themselves look a lot like wasp traps, with a green plastic body on a wire stake. You have probably noticed them throughout the local neighborhoods. Hopefully, if everyone cooperates with the experts on this, we can avoid this pest having a serious environmental impact on our region.
