They got married and moved to Tigard in 2018. "We bought our house 1½ years ago and wanted a fixer-upper, and we got it," she said. "It's fun to get our hands dirty."



Jennifer took time off from work when the Stifflers had their two sons, Liam, 4, and Caleb, 1, and going back to work after 22 years in the restaurant industry, she decided it was time for a career change. When job-hunting earlier this year, Jennifer was looking at administrative assistant jobs, and the Summerfield job – not far from her new home – almost fell into her lap.

"I wouldn't want to work in a restaurant I wouldn't eat in, and I knew I didn't want to work in a cubicle crunching numbers for someone I had never met," she said. "I looked at different jobs and while interviewing at a temp agency was told about this job."

After taking time off from working, Jennifer said, "I'm excited to be back providing for my family." Two months into the HOA business, Jennifer loves the Summerfield job. "It allows me to use my management skills and be the mom I want to be," she said. "When I was working at restaurants, the hours were demanding, and I was on-call on the weekends. This job is like a breath of fresh air. I have to be able to pivot from one thing to another just like I did in the restaurant business."

SCA Board Meeting

This report is a <u>recap</u> of the meeting. For details, see the minutes on the Clubhouse bulletin board.

May 9, 2022

President Sharon Strain called the meeting to order at 9:00 AM. No visitors signed in to speak. Minutes accepted from the April 11th, 2022, regular Board Meeting.

Golf Pro Shop Report – R. Lindsey: It was said that "weather drives business" in golf. With 16 measurable rain days and two days closed for aerification, golf numbers were down from previous trend yet still ahead of pre-Covid numbers with 2,973 rounds played. The Chapmans have started for the 2022 season.

City of Tigard Liaison Report – Sherman:
Barbara Sherman relayed that the current
Mayor of Tigard, Jason Snider, is unable to run
for re-election due to length of service to the
City Council. Groundbreaking for the Universal
Plaza off of Burnham Rd. is set for June
beginning with a tile-based, sensor-run splash
pad and light display, and the second phase
will include a covered picnic area.

Treasurer's Report: Operating account: April 2022 total income of \$53,259.72. April 2022 total expenditures of \$105,244.64. Cash on hand as of 4/30/2022 \$924,728.95. Reserve account: April 2022 total income of \$88.38. April 2022 total expenditures of (5,321.52) General reserve balance as of 4/30/22 \$1,412,850.87. New Buyer Fee income for April \$12,000. New Buyer Fee expenses for April \$(5.00). New Buyer Fee interest & income \$7.94. New Buyer Fee account balance as of 4/30/22 \$204,410.17. Total General Reserves plus New Buyers Fee Account as of 4/30/22 \$1,617,261.04.

Motion made (Hughes), seconded (Madden)
and approved to accept the entire Treasurer's
report.

Administrator's Report: Working with lawyers regarding outstanding assessment fees for one resident household. In addition, working with lawyers regarding updating any governing documents verbiage that could be seen as discriminatory as required for a House Bill passed late last year. It was a great experience



working with the nominating committee to obtain our top three candidates for the upcoming Board.

Unfinished Business:

A. Revised Lawn Mower Reel Funding Motion made (Madden), seconded (Johnson) to accept updated price of \$16,253.65 for the three lawn mower reels required to complete the purchase of the new lawn mower in 2021. Motion passed.

New Business:

B. Pool Chemistry Controller

Motion made (Johnson), seconded (Kellogg) to accept updated price from Pool and Spa House to upgrade the pool chemistry controller as price has gone up from \$6,412.45 to \$7,472.20. Motion passed (4-1).

C. Sidewalk Repairs Update

Motion was made (Johnson) seconded (Madden), to accept additional \$200 charge for curve correction necessary on Alderbrook Drive sidewalk repair due to tree inhibiting 48-inch allowance for ADA compliance. Motion passed.

D. Revision of Summerfield Entry Sign on Durham Road

After Board discussion, motion made (Madden), seconded (Kellogg) to require Marketing Committee to revise the plan for the sign revision, including a detailed breakdown of work to be done, including bids for the work with exact numbers. Motion passed.

E. Proposed Veteran's Day Complimentary Golf and BBQ

Motion made (Madden), seconded (Johnson) to enact an annual Veteran's Day Complimentary Golf Day & BBQ, allowing any veteran to sign up for a free round of golf, resident or non-resident, as tee times permit. Motion passed.

F. Announcement of 2022 Nominated Candidates

Madden announced that the Nominating Committee met, discussed, reviewed and voted on the 6 candidates who accepted their nominations for Board consideration. As there are three outgoing Board members, the top three were selected as official Board candidates to be voted on during the July Annual Meeting. A Meet the Candidates night is set for June 23rd.

The Candidates are Steve Blake, Dianne Phelps and JJ Gattuccio. Unless written petition with 25 resident signatures is turned in prior to the Annual Meeting, these three candidates will be voted in as the newest Board Directors.

Hughes expressed need for all Clubs and Committees to be reminded of requirements for submitting requests that the SCA office will handle.

Johnson – Liaison to Swimming Pool, Common Area Landscape, Courts: Swimming Pool is open.

Kellogg – Liaison to Clubs/Activities, Neighborhood Watch, Newcomers: Motion made (Kellogg), seconded

(Madden) to accept Carene Svoboda as temporary chair of Newcomers Welcome Committee. Motion passed.

Strain – Liaison to Directory, Fair Housing, Website: Website Committee is meeting in June, progress is coming along with the new website.

Meeting adjourned at 10:08 AM. Next regular Board Meeting is June 13th, 2022, at 9:00 AM.


Pickleball Club News

Disaster Preparedness: Let There Be Light

If a moderate power outage happens, or the anticipated large Earthquake occurs, you might want to see at night – maybe not all night but at least to have a meal, wash up and then try to sleep. Let's say you might need 2 to 3 hours of emergency light after sundown – here are several ways to be prepared to do that.

- 1. Basic candles and/or kerosene lamps: not great for reading and a little dangerous but useful if nothing else is available.
- 2. Flashlights: handy for seeing your way around but not much good for room lighting. Usually they are battery powered but small ones are available with a lever handle to pump and generate current to power the light for a short period.
- 3. Battery-powered incandescent lamps: many varieties are available, starting with battery powered camping lamps from REI or Amazon. They are usually a combination flashlight and a pop-up bigger section for full 360 degree illumination. Most run on 2 or 3 AA batteries but there are often ones with larger battery power.
- 4. Lithium-ion powered light emitting diode lamps: these are very efficient and can light up a large area, given a good design. One style is a 4 in. cylindrical bed-side lamp, 10 in. high, powered by internal batteries and charged via USB connections to any normal USB connection. They turn on by touch, have several levels of illumination, can light up a room fairly well and can run about 10 hours on a charge. Amazon has many different sizes and prices of these. If one has any power packs for cell phone recharging or car adapters for USB connections, these lamps can be recharged many times and support almost normal night time operations. There are also hand crank lanterns available in various sizes and powers that run off internal batteries once charged by the crank. Harbor Freight has some for a moderate price.
- 5. Solar powered/charged lamps: REI and Amazon have various sizes of solar-powered camping lamps and flashlights that can be used and easily recharged by sunlight. Some are combined with all-band radios and other functional purposes and can also be used to recharge other items.

The above lists give one a wide selection of types and sizes of lights for use in emergencies – you should have some form of them to be prepared for a power/light emergency in the future. (If you have an emergency and have not stocked up on emergency lights, you can always bring in the walkway lights from the garden or driveway and read by them)

We would like a larger membership for the Committee to help Summerfield residents be prepared for any emergencies.



So I decided I would ask what the official policy was to clear up this matter once and for all. Enter chaos... It turns out not only is there not an official policy as to how, or who should maintain the borders of the golf course, but it is also a very difficult and time-consuming process to create a policy, since it would involve modifying the Conditions, Covenants and Restrictions for Summerfield residents.

So in the interest of corralling the chaos, I have a few suggestions/requests for how you can easily maintain your property line if it runs along the golf course. The key here is to create a 4-6 inch buffer area between the golf course and any wall/fence on your property line so our mower can get all the grass each week when we mow borders. The best way that a few residents have done this is to bury bricks flush to the ground and up against any wall or fence they have on the property line. This works amazingly well because we can then mow over the bricks and this gives us enough buffer to not leave a line of unsightly tall grass. Another way to create this buffer is to spray Roundup along the property line. This works just as well, I would only ask that you please don't use Casoron as it can bleed very badly under the right conditions. The other thing you can do is to weed eat and maintain the border yourself how you want it maintained.

Lastly, in the case that maybe you or your landscaper overlooks this area for some time and it becomes unsightly, I will deal with the area how I think is best to keep up the appearance and reputation of Summerfield. I can't promise we will get to it as soon as I would like or maintain it exactly how you might like, but we will keep it from getting overly chaotic. Submitted by Zach Palmer
