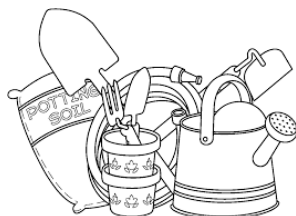

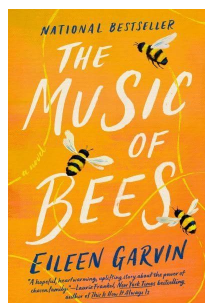

SUMMERFIELD RESIDENTS PERFORM THEIR STORY

Summerfield residents Mark and Helena Greathouse, whose first cabaret show has been performed in Summerfield and around the metro area and the United States, will present a new show in January in Summerfield.

The world premiere of "Life Is a Cabaret" will be performed on Sunday, January 22, at 3 PM, in the Summerfield Clubhouse as a benefit for Ukraine through Mercy Corps.

This is the Greathouses' second original show and is a musical comedy describing their lives together from 1968, when they met as foreign college students in West Germany, to the present time.

Through flashbacks, the show highlights some avant-garde Czech songs from the 1930s between the two World Wars as well as some later ones during the Cold War.

"Both of us lived through the Cold War, each on opposite sides of the Iron Curtain," Helena said. "In the show, we share through dialogue our firsthand experiences about that time."

"Life is a Cabaret" contains 12 mostly cabaret songs, both American and Czech, with Mark playing the accordion and Helena singing. The songs include four popular Czech cabaret songs and four of Mark's own compositions, which are interspersed with dialogue retelling funny stories from their lives.

Their first show is called "You Do Speak English, Don't You?" and has been performed more than 35 times since 2014, mostly in public libraries around the U.S.

The Greathouses' have owned four cats over the years, and Mark has composed three cat songs, all of which are in the new show. The photo is from the song "Sneaky Steps," when the cat has her master wrapped around her little paw.

Welcome to 2023! Your Summerfield Disaster Preparedness Committee has been busy planning for the year ahead with the help of some volunteers in the Oaktree Lane area and the Community Outreach Director from the Tigard Community Emergency Response Team (CERT). Our goal is to make sure all Summerfield residents have the information we ALL need to become prepared and know what to do to respond if a disaster strikes in our 55+ community. To that end we have three exciting announcements:

1. First, this year we are pleased to offer a free quarterly educational Disaster Preparedness Lecture series in the Lakeside Room as listed below:

SAFETY AROUND SUMMERFIELD

Lately, there has been a lot of talk from residents about safety in many different contexts. Some are very concerned over the traffic within the neighborhood whether vehicles are speeding, taking shortcuts – including school busses, or vehicles illegally parking in the area. There has been a lot talk about signage around Summerfield either being faded, questions if a sign is still relevant and even places where more signage could be used. There have been concerns about racial harassment experiences which is very much inexcusable. Times, people and vehicle movement are all very much changing in a direction that at times seems backward. It is important that everyone do their part to keep our sidewalks, streets, and property safe and report the issues that we see. If you witness or have concerns about issues, please email the Administrator at admin@summerfield55.org and let those concerns be heard so that (fingers crossed) we can try to find a solution. In the meantime, here are some things we know.

Summerfield is currently working on putting together a team to identify areas where signage could be useful or might need an update. The City of Tigard replaced our 25 mph signs with 20 mph signs in December.

If those school busses get to you, just call the office around the corner on Hall Blvd. and they should tell the drivers to stop coming through our neighborhood. Student Transportation of America 503-372-5704.

A small group has already had a meeting/discussion with a member of the Community Engagement Coordinator, Maddie Bauer, to bring up some of the issues at hand. Maddie's department is a part of the Tigard Police Department and she had very valuable information to share with us as well as helped field other City concerns that we brought up.

You can report a Tigard Traffic Concern through the website: www.tigard-or.gov/your-government/departments/police/traffic-safety and click on the green "submit a concern". It was explained that when an item is reported, it is forwarded to any City department it might relate to. It gets mapped and followed and as more concerns come in, the City looks into ways to resolve the issue.

It was also shared that while many residents would like to see the Tigard Police around more often, there are only three officers on at any given time in ALL of Tigard. They currently have 8 open positions and zero applicants. There just simply isn't enough patrol to go around for Summerfield to have a greater police presence.

Hate crimes whether they involve hate speech, race, ethnicity, gender, disability, or religion... is never okay. It can be scary sometimes to speak up if you witness something or believe something is going on. 911 can always be called. The Oregon Attorney General has a form available for people to fill out to report such crimes, in which, the form will get to the right local government to investigate. <https://justice.oregon.gov/CrimeReporting/BiasCrime>.
