PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Ever since moving to Summerfield, I have heard an undercurrent questioning the viability of our golf course. Many of our members who do not play golf question why a portion of their annual assessment goes to supporting golf. I hope to address that issue in this column.

First, the golf course is the centerpiece of our community. It attracts numerous people to Summerfield both as daily golfers and more importantly as homeowners and potential homeowners. Studies have shown that homes in communities with golf courses have increased value. Conversely these studies have also shown that home values decrease if the golf amenities are allowed to deteriorate.

Since the advent of Covid, our course has seen an uptick in play from daily golfers. Currently the course is operating at near full capacity giving us record revenues. This has significantly reduced the impact on the annual assessment. The Board is committed to consistently reviewing our golf fee schedules and increase them as much as possible while staying competitive.

The other major factor is what would happen to our assessment if we did close the golf course. If we were to close the course, we could not do anything with that property but maintain it as an open green space. While the cost of maintenance would be less than the cost of maintaining and operating the golf course, it would still be substantial, and there would be no golf revenues to offset these costs. We estimate that the annual assessment would have to increase at least \$90 to \$150 or possibly more.

Another issue to consider is that we would have no control over people using the green space which could lead to a loss of privacy and other undesired problems.

We all benefit in one way or another from the golf course.

They put their earnest money down in April 1978, before their house was finished, and Sharon was



excited to be able to select avocado green appliances and gold shag carpeting for their new home! Since the Sattler Farm still existed behind the few homes built on the east side of the street, Bill and several neighbor men would often walk over to the fence and give the farm animals treats in the evening. During the Tigard Balloon Festival, the balloons would gather in a staging area at a nearby school and fly over Summerfield to Cook Park for the Balloon Race. Sharon remembers hearing an unusual sound one morning while on her patio and opened her front door to find that a balloon gondola and pilot had landed right outside! The pilot thought he could get over the tall tree across the street to get into the field. He was successful!

SCA BOARD MEETING RECAP

This report is a recap of the meeting. For details, see the minutes on the Clubhouse bulletin board.

March 18, 2024

Present: Vice President, Tom Clancy, Valerie Wicklund, Director, Carol Knutson, Treasurer, JJ Gattuccio, Director, Steve Blake, President, Dianne Phelps, Director, Pat VanOsdel, Director, Jennifer Stiffler, Administrator

Absent:Lance Yunck, Apartments, Manager, Estates.

President Steve Blake called the meeting to order at 9:00 AM.

Minutes: A motion was made and seconded to accept the February **Board Meeting Minutes with noted** corrections. Motion passed, 7-0.

Golf Course Report - Palmer: The golf course is still much too wet for carts to be driven on the greens. Aerification to happen April 8th and 9th. Zach will work with the Greens Committee and CALC to look for tree replacements as required from City of Tigard after removing the 16 Poplar Trees in 2023.

Golf Pro Shop Report – R. Lindsey:

Still a lot of rainy days but the warm sunny days made for great play. Golf passes down 37 from 2023. 12 past pass holders have passed away or moved, about 5-7 pass holders are new residents, and many are opting for punch cards this year.

City of Tigard Liaison Report -

Sherman: Hall Blvd. west of 99 is closed for the next 9 months. The City of Tigard sent out a survey regarding a fireworks ban in Tigard and it failed with only 46% wanting the ban.

Treasurer's Report - Knutson: Total February revenue is \$350,062.21, total February expenditures are \$78,498.56, and total cash on hand as of 2/29/2024 is \$1,521,579.61. The General Reserve's beginning balance is \$1,492,502.15, total revenue is \$3,748.91, total interest is \$1,025.31, the total expenditures are \$45,148.47, and the ending General Reserve balance as of 2/29/2024 is \$1,452,127.90. The beginning balance of the New Buyer Fee is \$226,169.91, the New Buyer Fee revenue is \$2,000, NBF expenses were \$1,400, and NBF interest earned is \$44.65, with an ending balance of \$226,814.56. The total balance of the Reserve Accounts is \$1,678,942.46 as of 2/29/2024. Heritage Bank checks written were 6129-6171. WaFd checks written were resident was able to call for Help 260. Northwest Bank checks written were 1007-1012. A motion was made and seconded to accept the treasurer's report made. Motion passed, 7-0.

Carol Knutson left the meeting.

Unfinished Business: None.

New Business:

Golf Walk Proposal - A motion was made and seconded to approve Jon Erickson's proposal for an organized golf course walk to be held once with consideration for future events. Motion passed, 6-0.

50th Anniversary Funds Request – A motion was made and seconded to approve of the 50th anniversary committee using \$600 of their \$6,000 budget to hire an orchestra for a concert as part of the Anniversary events. Motion passed, 6-0.

Electric Piano Proposal – A motion was made and seconded to accept the

Clubhouse Committees proposal for the purchase of an electric piano for use in the Clubhouse at the price of \$3500. Motion passed, 5-1.

Internal Control Proposal – A motion was made and seconded to accept the proposed addition to the Financial Management Policy to include rules about company credit card use. Section A 1.10.6 and A 1.10.6a. Motion passed, 6-0.

Administrator's Report: There are currently 23 unpaid assessments. 2 homes closed in February. There was an incident with the ADA Lift in the Clubhouse on March 16th where a resident was stuck. The Emergency Call button was used but the service did not provide help. The stuck when another resident entered the Clubhouse, and they were able to get a hold of someone with access to the lift key. The office is looking into ways to improve the emergency response and ensure anyone who may find themselves stuck can be rescued easily.

Directors' Roundtable:

Dianne Phelps: Clubhouse, Library, Disaster Preparedness & Safety - A motion was made and seconded to accept Rhonda Butler-Villa as a new member of the Clubhouse Committee. Motion passed 6-0. The Clubhouse Committee is working on bids for the Lakeview Room enclosure as well as artwork for above the fireplace. Disaster Preparedness & Safety will give talks about avoiding scams and later about CPR/AEDs. DPSC has moved their meetings to the 2nd Wednesday of each month at 3 PM.



The state requires us to sign in with every visit. The clipboard to sign in is on the pump house building to the right side of the door.

Printed rules are available in the literature rack outside the office and on the pool entrance doors and the website.

Longer days and sunshine can only mean one thing – it's spring! If you've recovered from the time change, you might be thinking about home and outdoor projects. Here are some 'best practices' as you talk with contractors about your project:

- Determine your priorities and budget, including a \$ amount for contingencies
- ♦ Define the specific scope of work what is the desired end result
- ♦ Get several bids, and be sure all bids are for the same scope of work
- ♦ Keep records and notes
- ♦ Ensure the contractors have the appropriate licensing and insurance
- Read reviews on social media; check with the Better Business Bureau; check references; ask neighbors for referrals
- Carefully read the final contract/agreement who is responsible for what (materials, permits, city codes, locating services, etc.), does the bid match the exact scope of work, what is the payment plan, how are changes handled, what is the timing, is the work guaranteed



When you're meeting with a contractor about a project or signing an agreement for work, consider having a friend or neighbor sit in to be another set of eyes and ears. And don't forget to submit a Summerfield Change Request!


