July 15th, 2024

President Steve Blake called the meeting to order at 9:00 AM.

Minutes: A motion was made (Gattuccio) and seconded (VanOsdel) to accept the June Board Meeting Minutes. Motion passed, 7-0.

Golf Course Report – Palmer: Cart paths are set to be resealed on July 24-25 in time for Member Guest on July 26th. There is a water line leak on Alderbrook Drive between the 3rd hole and 4th tee. Repairs will begin this week.

A motion was made (Gattuccio) and seconded (VanOsdel) to accept the proposal from Milroy Golf Construction to complete the water line repairs with a not to exceed \$12,000. Motion passed 7-0.

Golf Pro Shop Report – R. Lindsey: Golf Course had a great June. 2nd best June on record. Membership rounds are down over 300 rounds in June. July has been very hot, with a lull in rounds between 1 PM – 5 PM.

City of Tigard Liaison Report – Sherman: Interim Police Chief McDonald was officially appointed as Chief. He is the first Police Chief in Tigard to work through all the ranks to Chief. National Night out is August 6th.

Treasurer's Report – Acker: Total cash on hand in June was \$1,031,440. The

reserve total at the end of June was \$2,042,943. Checks were consecutive with 2 voids.

Unfinished Business:

Common Area Sidewalk Repairs – A motion was made (Gattuccio) and seconded (Acker) to accept the sidewalk bids from Keystone Industries and Safe Sidewalks to repair several areas of Common Area Sidewalks with a not to exceed budget of \$20,000. Motion passed 7-0.

New Business:

CALC Proposal for Plantings on 104th – A motion was made (VanOsdel) and seconded (Phelps) to accept the proposal from Innovative Landscaping for the plantings on 104th. Motion passed 7-0.

Update to Policy and Procedure Section A 1.10.6 – A motion was made (Acker) and seconded (VanOsdel) to accept the updated P & P Section A 1.10.6 to clean up unnecessary procedures and allow for Audits and Reviews as the Board sees fit. Motion passed, 7-0.

Communications Committee – A motion was made (Blake) and seconded (Gattuccio) to create a new SCA Committee for Communications, to be led by Tom Clancy as Chairperson. Motion passed, 7-0.

Finance Committee – A motion was made (Blake) and seconded (Gattuccio) to form a new SCA Committee for Finance. Motion passed, 7-0.

President Steve Blake called an intermission for 5 minutes at 10:25 AM. The meeting resumed at 10:30 AM.

Administrator's Report: 6 homes sold in June. There are 7 individuals with outstanding assessments. Vote HOA Now was a successful campaign platform – 708 residents voted for the

Annual Meeting.

Directors' Roundtable:

Dianne Phelps: Clubhouse, Library, Disaster Preparedness & Safety- A motion was made (Phelps) and seconded (Acker) to accept Claire Frye, Marianne McAnulty, and Ashley Moen as new members of the Clubhouse Committee. Motion passed, 7-0. Disaster Preparedness & Safety has upcoming events scheduled for First Aid Training, September 12 & 20.

Pat VanOsdel: Newcomers, Clubs & Activities – Newcomers Welcome group is officially chaired by Becky Wright and Lindy Alexander.

Tom Clancy: A/L, Wellness & Fitness, Fine Schedule– A/L is working with Sherwin Williams to put the color book online for homeowners to view.

JJ Gattuccio: Pool, Greens, CALC – Pool Committee is purchasing a new hopper for the Chlorine distribution.

Steve Blake: Website, Marketing, 50th Anniversary– Board of Director Liaison Assignments are as follows: Steve Blake – Communications, Pat VanOsdel – Sub Associations and Swimming Pool, JJ Gattuccio – CALC and Pro Shop, Carene Svoboda – Newcomers and Disaster Preparedness & Safety, Johnny Giccatti – Greens and Architecture/Landscape, John Acker – Volunteer Appreciation and Library, Dianne Phelps – Clubhouse and Wellness & Fitness.

The meeting was called to order by President Steve Blake at 7:00 PM.

The Board of Directors was introduced.

Approval of Minutes

The minutes from the 2023 Annual Meeting were approved by majority vote.

Directors Reports

Steve Blake – Liaison to Website, Marketing, & 50th Anniversary Committees:

The website is an invaluable tool for Summerfield residents as well as prospective new residents. New update includes an up-to-date property listings button under “Live Here.” Marketing is continuing to work on a 3-5 year marketing plan for Summerfield, updating photography for the website and marketing needs, utilizing social media to aid in branding, and a new Summerfield brochure. The 50th Anniversary Committee has been planning events throughout the year such as a 1970s Potluck, a concert, and coming up in August, a Social Fair.

Carol Knutson – Liaison to Pro Shop and Volunteer Appreciation:

Golf Pro, Rob Lindsey, is doing a great job in the Pro Shop. Summerfield recorded 45,522 golf rounds played in 2023 with a revenue of \$503,411. Volunteer Appreciation held its Annual Appreciation Event on April 16th, 2024. Coming up is the Annual Veteran’s Day Event on November 11th, 2024.

Pat VanOsdel – Liaison to Newcomers

Welcome, Clubs/Activities, Sub Associations, and the Summary Newsletter:

The Newcomers Welcome Committee has been greeting new residents all year and organizing monthly Clubhouse tours. They had a successful Newcomers Wine Social in April and are looking forward to their Annual New Resident Fair in the fall. The Clubhouse is a very busy place these days with over 2200 scheduled events. Newly added Clubs and Activities are the Drum Circle and the Summerfield Socials Group. Summerfield is home to Eight (8) Sub-Associations including three Condominium Associations and five Townhouse Associations. Leaders from these Sub-Associations get together every other month to discuss issues that are relevant to their communities. The *Summary* Newsletter is made up of contributions from up to 40 contributors. The Summary is available on the website monthly, as well as distributed through mail and email.

JJ Gattuccio – Liaison to Common Area Landscape, Greens, and Pool:

Common Area Landscape has been working hard on cleaning up and beautifying several areas of Summerfield Common Area including the corner of SW 98th, the median on 104th, and assessing the health and needs of many Common Area trees and Shrubs. The Summerfield Pool is open and being well attended. The Pool deck has all new furniture which is commercial quality and hopefully easier to move around and get in and out of. The Greens Committee has been hard at work ensuring the Golf Course is being well maintained. Their future projects include a proposal for a practice bunker, hitting bays, and replacing aging decking on the bridge.

Dianne Phelps – Liaison to Clubhouse, Library, and Disaster Preparedness & Safety:

Report read by Tom Clancy – Clubhouse Committee has had an amazing year of updates around the Clubhouse including the Kitchen remodel, Living Room/Lobby furniture and décor

update, Fireplace art work replaced, new carpet installed in the Lower Level, Pro Shop, and Conference Room, reconfiguring the Lower Lobby to include the Pool Table, reorganized 3 Clubhouse storage areas to maximize usage, purchased collapsible carts to save space, and purchased an electric piano for the Ballroom. The Library is running smoothly as usual. The Library Committee works very hard to ensure a variety of materials are available to residents such as books, newspapers, magazines, CDs, DVDs, and puzzles. Disaster Preparedness & Safety has been working on hosting educational talks open to residents with topics including Emergency Readiness, Scam Prevention, First Aid/CPR, and AED operation.

Tom Clancy – Liaison to Architecture/Landscape, Wellness & Fitness, and Nominating Committee:

The Arch/Landscape Committee is made up of 7 area representatives who have processed over 180 change requests in the last 12 months. Homeowners are busy working on fences, painting, landscaping, decks, chimneys, driveways, roofs, windows, solar panels, golf screens, water features, and HVAC equipment. The updated A/L Manual is available online and at the Office. Wellness & Fitness has completed an amazing Fitness Room transformation with 9 new machines, new weights, new lighting, gym flooring, and exercise posters. The Nomination Committee is a 15 member committee put together by the SCA Board V.P. and consists of various residents representing many areas, sub associations, and activities of Summerfield. This year the job of the Nominating Committee was a little different as the candidates were put to a vote by the residents instead of selected by the Nominating Committee. The committee did a fantastic job pivoting with this change and assisting the Office with developing the updated process of Candidate Election.

Financial Report – Carol Knutson, Treasurer

For 2023, Civic Assessments & Miscellaneous revenue was \$1,051,717, and the Golf revenue was \$503,411 for a total revenue of \$1,555,128. The expenses for Administration were \$510,700, Golf came to \$645,257, and \$175,000 for a Transfer to Reserves, for total expenses of \$1,330,957.

For 2024, the revenue through 6/30/24 includes Administrative & Miscellaneous revenue of \$987,372 and Golf Revenue of \$307,171 for a total revenue of \$1,294,543. The Administrative Expenses were \$249,058; Golf Expenses are \$319,073 and Transfer to Reserves of \$350,000 for a total of \$918,131, under budget \$21,684.

For the 2023 Reserves, the beginning balance was \$1,509,404 and the ending balance was \$1,725,660. New Buyer's Fees collected was \$88,000.

Major Reserves expenditures in 2023 included SCA Office Renewal, Building Envelop Study, Kitchen Renewal, Clubhouse Living Room Renewal.

Board Member Nomination

Tom Clancy – Introducing our Candidates: Carene Svoboda, Chuck Coiner, Johnny Giccatti, Marshall Henry, and Ronda Butler-Villa. In a first ever vote by email campaign led by Vote HOA Now, as well as by paper ballot, Summerfield had 708 votes completed.

The candidates elected to the 2024-2025 SCA Board of Directors are Carene Svoboda and Johnny Giccatti. Welcome!

The Board adjourned to the Conference Room to elect officers for 2024-2025.

Administrators Report – Jennifer Stiffler, Administrator & Non-Voting Secretary of the Board:

A huge thank you to Zach Palmer, Golf Course Superintendent, for his 19 years of service. Thank you to Chris Allen, Clubhouse Maintenance, for his 22 years of service. And thank you and Welcome to our new Front Office/Bookkeeper, Rachel Funderhide, who joined us in March.

Looking forward to those who served. See you on August 2nd.

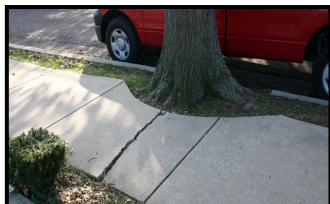

ARCHITECTURE/LANDSCAPE

My dog Stella and I see many walkers out early and late across Summerfield throughout the year in every weather condition. Some of us walk in the street, some on the sidewalk, and some of us with a furry companion do both! Sometimes the sidewalks are tough to traverse due to tree limbs, and raised or sunken concrete panels.

This is a friendly reminder that both of these conditions are the responsibility of each homeowner, covered under Summerfield's Architectural & Landscape manual and Tigard's Municipal Code. Please take a minute to see if

tree limbs are growing past your yard and if they impede anyone walking on the sidewalk, please have them trimmed. The same for the condition of your sidewalk; concrete contractors can grind down raised edges or replace entire panels. These rules also apply to the sidewalks and planting strips next to the street if your home backs up to Sattler or Durham.



Thank you for keeping an eye on your property and helping make Summerfield a safe and beautiful place to live.

MEET A SUMMERFIELD RESIDENT!

Frank Heyl, now 101, was born in Zillah, Washington, on July 19, 1923. The summer after his junior year in high school, he worked on a U.S. Forest Service Lookout, alone in a tower, making \$80/month spotting fires. He enlisted in the U.S. Army Air Force on his 18th birthday, went to Military Flight School during WWII and flew B25 Mitchell Bombers. Frank was to be discharged in 1946, but wanted to stay in the Military, as he was making \$250/month. His commander told him, "See a psychiatrist if you want to stay in!" Instead, he visited with a chaplain, who told him to check the Manning Table for available jobs. Frank then became a Small Arms Training Officer and had seven different jobs in the Army Air Force. When the Army split from the Air Force in 1946, Frank chose to stay with the U.S. Air Force.

Frank stayed in the Air Force Reserve and completed his degree in Education at Lewis and Clark in two years! He then taught 5th grade, which he thoroughly enjoyed.

Frank met his wife, Alice, on a blind date. They married right before he was sent to serve in the Korean War, where he was a Troop Carrier and Medivac Pilot. After the Korean War, Frank and Alice moved to Japan for two years, where Frank was the Flying Safety and Education Officer, and a Medivac Pilot.

While still in the Oregon Army National Guard, Frank flew a helicopter for FBI agents for five or six days, searching for D.B. Cooper, the first skyjacker, in November 1971. He then volunteered as a ground searcher for several days. After Mt. St. Helens erupted in May 1980, Colonel Bill Gottlieb and Frank, as his co-pilot, flew two helicopter flights with two or three Oregon State University geologists near the crater of Mt. St. Helens. They landed near where the lodge would have been to set up instruments to record volcanic activity.

Frank set up the Combat Aviation Survival School for the Army National Guard after the Korean War and was a Survival Instructor. He has taught Survival classes in several countries for the Military and has written two books on Cold Weather Survival and one book on Wilderness Survival. He became a Civilian Contractor in 1981, after retirement, teaching Combat Aviation Survival, and continued to teach two or three Survival classes as a contractor, while living in Summerfield. The author, Jean Auel, took his Survival class while researching her book, Clan of the Cave Bear. He has an autographed copy of her book.

In 2009, Alice had a friend living in Summerfield, and with three children grown and gone, they decided to downsize and bought a home on Highland Drive. Frank and Alice were married six months short of 60 years. Frank has three grandchildren.

Between WWII and the Korean War, Frank flew in the U.S. Air Force Reserve with Ron Sorenson, who later developed Summerfield.

Frank retired on his 58th birthday as a Lieutenant Colonel and Pilot with 40 years of service in the U.S. Army, the U.S. Air Force, the Air Force Reserve and the Army National Guard. He has flown six types of military aircraft, including trainers, bombers, troop carriers, Medivac, Air Sea Rescue and helicopters.

Several years ago, Frank flew with the WWII veterans on the Honor Flight from Portland to Washington, D.C. He continues to speak at Tillamook Air Museum and has spoken at Evergreen Aviation and Space Museum.

In Summerfield, Frank works out in the morning with the Tai Chi class three days a week and tries to walk up the steps from the Lower Lobby to the Main Floor five times, three days a week. You will see him regularly at Monday Morning Coffee and Tuesday Happy Hour, always with a bright smile on his face! He is a founding member of Summerfield Military Vets, which meets monthly on the first Friday of the month at 2 PM in the Card Room.

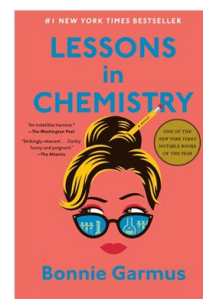

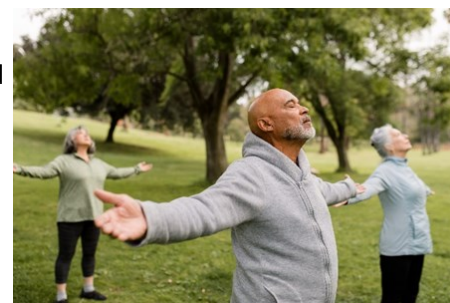

SWIMMING POOL

Many of our residents have experienced the “fun” of operating home pools before moving to Summerfield. Most of you, if asked, “Would you join the Pool Committee,” say no thanks. Been there and done that! So, did you know our community Pool is certified by county inspection under the auspices of Oregon State regulations (most of our listed 'pool rules') to operate safely to maintain sanitation and smooth mechanical operation? Effectively our Pool is like a residential pool on steroids. To these effects, since all the hard work is done for you, hopefully seamlessly, we expect you can know and follow the “rules” which are guidelines based on Oregon ordinances but mostly common sense. Such as putting umbrellas up and down without damaging by catching a 'spoke' on the fence. We must have the fence with private access, and we can't move it. The umbrella tables must stay 4 feet from the edge of the pool, placing some of the umbrellas precariously close to the fence. We've broken three umbrellas already this year. Signs on the tables are there to remind you to be careful.

A second reminder that no person wearing a diaper, young or old, may be inside the pool enclosure. Families with Infants may sit on the Clubhouse bench overlooking the Pool while older family members enjoy youth swim. One might possibly enlist another adult, say a neighbor, to assist if needed. Also, if you want to allow more than four guests per resident, ask a neighbor resident to accompany some of your guests to observe this rule.

DISTASTER PREPAREDNESS & SAFETY COMMITTEE

Did you know: that cell phones can be a valuable asset in an emergency? There are two emergency notification systems available to Summerfield residents via your cell phone.

1. Code Red - run by the City of Tigard - reports a long list of safety and emergency information to residents.
2. Eventbridge - run by Washington County - reports weather, crime, traffic, disasters, emergency support, and a host of other topics.

One needs to download either app from the appropriate "store" and fill out the registration information - a 5 min. task.

Once one has done this, it is vitally important to KEEP YOUR PHONE HANDY, not in your purse, not in the car, not on the charger in the garage!! Especially, - in the bathroom when bathing - keep it within reach! And keep it near, in the bedroom at night - keep it near and ON! - in case you have a personal emergency and need 911 support.

Granted the Cell Phone system has vulnerabilities. Solar storms and EMP attacks can damage or block the systems and power outages may degrade the system capabilities; however, most cell towers have battery backup for hours of emergency service and newer 5g towers have added generator backup. So protect yourself, loved ones, and your family with maximum use of a cell phone and connection monitoring from a warning/emergency system.

A reminder for September: The long-awaited First Aid Certification program is scheduled for Monday, Sept. 12th, 10 AM to 12 Noon in the Lakeview Room. The cost is only \$45 for the lecture and textbook. (A shorter course for full Certification and 60% less than earlier offerings.)

TRAFFIC CHANGE NOTICE FROM THE CITY OF TIGARD

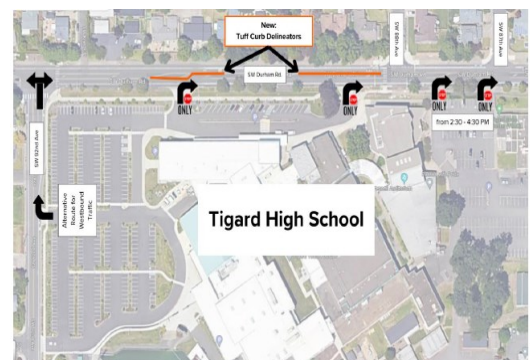
SW Durham Road Traffic Adjustments Safe Routes to School
