PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

This month and going forward, the President's Message will be a little different than it has been. In an effort to be more transparent, I will be using this column to keep you informed of issues being considered by the Board. You will also note that the minutes published in each issue of the *Summary* will be more detailed, especially when they require spending money. The Board has also decided that any proposals requiring significant cash outlays will not be voted on for at least one month after it is proposed, unless it is an emergency. This will give members the opportunity to comment.

That said, what's going on? The major proposal before the Board is a request for a practice/ warm up area for the Golf Course. Many of you have probably seen the drawings in the Clubhouse and by the Tennis Courts showing how the proposed hitting cages would fit into the existing space around the courts. The Board has not acted on this yet. As proposed, it would require a significant investment. Because of this and the impact on our property as well as nearby homes, we will be asking for your input, probably at a community meeting.

Other issues being considered include the creation of a finance committee to assist as follows: insure that we continue to keep our planning and spending under control; amend our policies and procedures, if necessary, to conform with current banking regulations; simplify our banking to make it easier to maximize our interest earnings, and insure all of our accounts are FDIC insured as they are currently. We are also looking at other ways to earn additional income such as selling advertising in the *Summary*, which would help us in keeping our annual assessment as low as possible.

In the near future we hope our new Communications Committee will be implementing some new ways for us to let you know what is happening in Summerfield. I also want to remind you that, with few exceptions, all of our meetings are open to our members.

President Steve Blake called the meeting to order at 9:00 AM.

<u>Minutes</u>: A motion was made (Phelps) and seconded (Gattucio) to accept the July Board Meeting Minutes. Motion passed, 7-0.

<u>Golf Course Report – Palmer</u>: Cart path seal coating is mostly complete, with #9 left to do. Golf Course Aerification is scheduled for September 9th & 10th.

Golf Pro Shop Report – R. Lindsey: July numbers were very good considering the heat wave, numbers were only slightly down. July beat the budget by a little over \$4,000, year to date beat budget by around \$22,000 so far. Club Championships are completed with Irma Trommlitz and Del Jordan taking the titles. There are 2 Chapman dinners in August, so the next Chapman dinner is on August 26th.

City of Tigard Liaison Report -

Sherman: City Council elections are coming up. The City of Tigard boasts 28 registered parties for the National Night Out on August 6th with over 960 participants. Into more flowers for areas around Summerfield.

Dianne Phelps: Clubhouse, Wellness & Fitness- Clubhouse Committee is still looking into closet/storage spaces

Treasurer's Report – Acker: Operating account total revenue was \$111,177. Expenses were \$116,633.75. Total cash on hand in the operating account as of 7/31/2024 was \$1,028,413.44. General reserve account total revenue earned was \$4,928.49, expenses were

\$62,150.00 for the cart path maintenance and parking lot seal coating. New Buyers Fees collected were \$8,000, interest earned was \$59.07. The total Reserves balance as of 7/31/2024 was \$1,993,780.99. A fully funded reserve fund according to the 2024 Reserve Study is 2,398,098. **Unfinished Business:** None.

Johnny Giccatti – Greens and Architecture/Landscape – Ideas to be proposed to A/L Committee such as Green Thumb Award for best yard. Suggestion to the Board that CALC look into more flowers for areas around Summerfield.

Dianne Phelps: Clubhouse, Wellness 8 Fitness- Clubhouse Committee is still looking into closet/storage spaces around the Clubhouse. Request made for approval of closet shelving in the main closet in Clubhouse Lobby, total for project is under \$400 so if deemed appropriate – Clubhouse can work out details with Administrator.

Pat VanOsdel: Sub Associations,

Swimming Pool received new larger hopper for the chlorinator. The Pool Committee is looking to get a budget request but together to include a few

Swimming Pool, and Marketing -

Committee is looking to get a budget request put together to include a few pool chairs with wider seats for next year. Swimming Pool is set to close on October 14th, weather permitting. The Marketing Committee is developing a brochure for Summerfield as well as a 3 –5-year marketing plan.

JJ Gattuccio: CALC and Pro Shop – CALC was introduced to the Backyard Habitat Program and was accepted so CALC is looking at areas where they can start planning native plants.

Carene Svoboda – Newcomers and Disaster Preparedness & Safety –

Disaster Preparedness has upcoming First Aid sessions on September 12th or September 20th. They are also looking into another program in the Spring centered around Personal Defense. Only 2 people came to the July Clubhouse Tour, none in August. The Newcomers Event team is actively coordinating Oct 19th Newcomers Fair.

Steve Blake: Communications and 50th **Anniversary**— The Anniversary Fair is this weekend, August 24th. Jan Merrick is the new leader of the Website Team. They are working on new photography for the website.

SUMMERFIELD WOMEN'S GOLF CLUB RAISES OVER \$23,000 FOR LOCAL ORGANIZATION—CARING CLOSET

More than 1,000 Tigard-Tualatin School District students will be the beneficiaries of the Summerfield Women's Golf Club's generosity thanks to its recent \$23,350 donation to the Caring Closet.

Caring Closet Director Kim Thoren accepted a giant check (both literally and figuratively) from the fundraiser's cochairs, Sharon Strain and Sharon Stoesser, at the club's Aug. 1 meeting.



"I know how much work you put into this," Thorne said through tears. "Your generosity is hard for me to wrap my head around. I am so grateful for what this is going to do for our kids. Day in and day out, we have kids coming in. They are struggling. They are facing phenomenal circumstances."

The Caring Closet provides underprivileged students in the TTSD, who are referred by their school counselors, with clothes, shoes, underwear, hygiene products and emergency bedding. Families can shop once in the fall/winter and once in the spring.

"The favorite part of my job is when they come in to shop," Thorne said of the facility that is set up like a store. "We have students in foster care and ones who are homeless. We have students struggling with attendance because of the lack of attire, or sometimes they can't wash their clothes. This check will serve 1,167 students. This brings me such great joy."

Golf club President Joyce Knutson praised the club members for doing such an amazing job on this year's charity fundraiser that encompassed a golf tournament including T-box business sponsors and \$5 "miracle putts," a dinner, a silent auction, a raffle, a pay-to-play Trivial Pursuit event and donations from the public.

Carole Krueger was chair of the golf tournament, and Debbie Cruse chaired the dinner.

"Most of the committee was new, so we were learning how to do it as we went through it, so we did pretty well," said Strain, who added that the club raised \$19,000 last year - another record. She and Stoesser knew by mid-July

how much money had been raised but had to keep it a secret from everyone until the meeting. "We were bursting at the seams," Strain said.

The Caring Closet, located on the Templeton Elementary campus at 9550 S.W. Murdock St., Tigard, is closed during the summer and open by appointment only during the school year. Donations are always accepted, and volunteers are always needed.




