## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

As I am sitting here writing this column, I am looking at a foggy chilly morning. Summer is gone and we are headed into the dreary days of winter. Luckily for us there is still plenty to do in Summerfield even when the weather is not great. Many of our dedicated walkers will bundle up and be out there in almost any weather. The same is true for many of our golfers. If you are not a cold weather person, you can always take advantage of the many indoor activities at our Clubhouse.

We covered a number of issues, both old and new, at this month's Board meeting. The Board voted not to proceed with the proposed hitting cages at the golf course. While the golfers and the image of the golf course would benefit from a place to warm up before a round, we felt that we could not make this expenditure at this time.

Last month I informed you that the large oak tree in the center of Century Oak Drive was dying and had to be removed. The Board approved up to \$6500 to do this. We found out that this was actually the responsibility of the City of Tigard and they agreed that they would remove it. Now it is just a matter of how long it will take.

In an effort to improve our communication with our members, we have formed a Communications Committee which will include responsibility for the website and marketing. This Committee has started reviewing what some other HOAs are doing to keep their members informed and allow them to communicate more easily with the Board.

The Board has approved the purchase of three new drinking fountains for the Clubhouse. We anticipate installation by the end of the year.

The Board is working on updating a proposed Code of Conduct to be sure that the content matches our Policies and Procedures Manual. All Board members will be expected to sign this document.

Just a reminder that our meetings are open and you are welcome to join us.

## SCA BOARD MEETING RECAP

President Steve Blake called the meeting to order at 9:00 AM.

Visitors: Anita Derry, Denise Hennig, and Marja Gillam signed in to speak.

Minutes: A motion was made (Gattucio) and seconded (VanOsdel) to accept the September Board Meeting Minutes with one correction. Motion passed unanimously.

**Golf Course Report – Palmer**: Absent. **Golf Pro Shop Report – R. Lindsey:** Absent.

#### City of Tigard Liaison Report -

**Sherman:** Tigard City Manager Steve Rymer announced that he is retiring effective Feb. 8, 2025. Area residents are encouraged to drop off leaves and donate non-perishable food items at the free Leaf Disposal and Food Drive between 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. on four Saturdays – Nov. 9 and 23, and Dec. 7 and 14 – in Cook Park. Leaves, small yard debris and clippings can be loose or bagged. Paper bags are preferred.

**Treasurer's Report – Acker:** Operating account total revenue was \$96,111.35, expenses were \$97,505.21. Total cash on hand in the operating account as of 9/30/2024 was \$997,507.55. General reserve account total revenue earned was \$1,599.43, expenses were \$24,192.63. New Buyers Fees collected were \$6,000, interest earned was \$61.42. The total Reserves balance as of 9/30/2024 was \$1,988,952.61. A fully

#### **Unfinished Business:**

**Greens Committee Proposal Decision -**A motion was made (Acker) and seconded (Phelps) to reject the proposal made in July from the Greens Committee for practice hitting cages due to not enough data present to show positive impact to Summerfield. Motion passed, 6-0 (Gattuccio abstained).

Century Oak Tree Update - A motion was made (Gattuccio ) and seconded (Giccatti) to rescind the approval of \$6500 to remove the dying oak on Century Oak as the City of Tigard claimed responsibility of the tree and will take over its care/removal. Motion passed unanimously.

**Downstairs Locker Rooms** – Discussion took place regarding what to do about the equipment in the downstairs Men's and Women's Locker Rooms given that there is no longer maintenance planned on the aging machines.

A Motion was made (Svoboda) and seconded (Phelps) to request user input regarding all exercising facilities of SCA through an official Survey. Motion passed 6-1 (Giccatti).

**Committee Reassignment** – Previous discussion took place regarding the proposal of combining the Marketing Committee with the Communications Committee and further discussion was tabled until more information can be gathered.

#### **New Business:**

Marketing Committee Plan -A motion was made (Blake) and seconded (Giccatti) to approve the proposed 2-5year Marketing Plan presented. Motion was tabled until more information can be gathered.

**Website Maintenance Proposal** – A motion was made (Phelps) and

seconded (VanOsdel) to accept the proposal from Musimak for website maintenance and triage as necessary with a 1 year contract totalling \$4500. Motion passed unanimously.

Clubhouse Water/Drinking Fountains -During the 2024 budget process, updating the aged water/drinking fountains around the Clubhouse was approved for an earmarked amount. A motion was made (Blake) and seconded (Phelps) to approve the purchase of the 3 proposed drinking fountains to be installed in the Clubhouse. Motion passed unanimously.

**Code of Conduct Form** – A motion was made (Phelps) and seconded (Gattuccio) to review and build upon the proposed Code of Conduct agreement to be included in Board training and signed by Board of Directors. Motion passed unanimously.

Administrator's Report: Of the 4 unpaid assessments, 3 have liens placed against the property and the 4th has been upgraded to foreclosure proceedings. 7 homes sold in September and currently 14 are listed and 4 pending. The budget process is about half way done with next steps being looking at the overall operating budget and proposing 2025 assessment. The preliminary budget will be presented to the Board in November and final approval will be at the December Board Meeting.

# ARCHITECTURE/LANDSCAPE COMMITTEE

It's beginning to look a lot like.....

The holiday decorations have been up at Costco since before Halloween, and you might be thinking it's time to get those outdoor lights and ornaments up. Summerfield is a beautiful area to drive around at night to experience all the sparkle and color.

Here are a couple of reminders about seasonal and holiday décor from the Summerfield Architectural & Landscape Manual:

- Exterior string holiday lights in any color are permissible to display
- A colored light is allowed in your driveway lamppost
- No lighting or decorations are allowed to be attached to golf ball screens
- Plastic figurines are not permitted except for a one-time specific special occasion, such as the holidays

No Change Request is required for seasonal/holiday décor. Reminder that all holiday decorations and lights must be removed within two weeks after the holiday.




## **Art Classes For All**

- 4. Learn where to seek shelter.
- 5. Identify community warning systems.
- 6. Include in your plan inputs from community and school plans.
- 7. Learn what to do for specific hazards.
- 8. Practice and maintain your plan.

Study and review of the training guide will give you and your family a firm basis for disaster survival of any type.

We look forward to seeing you even though you may not be able to make it every week. Any questions call Paula Henry at 503-713-8092.




